**3. ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2007**

**3.1 Mayor's Report 2007/08**

The Mayor read aloud his report for the year 1 July 2007 to 30 June 2008, as printed in the Annual Report that had been supplied to each elector present.

**3.2 Annual Report 2007/08**

As there were no questions from electors concerning the information contained in the Annual Report, the Mayor called for electors to receive the report, as follows:

**4. GENERAL BUSINESS**

For the information of those present, the Mayor read aloud the questions that had been received on notice. Responses to the questions had been provided by the City's Executive.

**4.1 Questions on Notice**

**Dr E C Manea, Haydock Street, Bunbury**

*Question 1:    What was the Council debt as at June 30 in years 2006, 2007, 2008?*

Response 1:    Council's debt as at 30 June was as follows:

Budgeted borrowings for the 2008/2009 financial year totalling \$3.74M includes: storm water drainage, public open space, road works and paths \$800,000; car parking \$1.3M and self-supporting loan for underground power \$1.64M

### Debt Management

Council places a strong management focus on maintaining debt ratio and debt service levels within an established target range. The 2008/2009 budget and Corporate Financial Plan 2008/09 – 2012/13 complies with the debt ratio target of less than 10% and debt service ratio target range of 4%-8%.

As at 30 June 2008, Council's debt ratio was 7.9% and the debt service ratio 6.9%. Council's outstanding debt at 30 June 2007 was \$11.07M and at 30 June 2008 \$9.6M. Interest paid on outstanding debt for 2007 was \$691,000 reducing to \$630,000 at 30 June 2008. Council held Reserve Funds of \$7.6M as at 30 June 2008.

*Question 2: What is the total cost of the use of consultants for the financial year ending June 30, 2008 and what was the purpose of the consultants?*

*Question 3: What was the total income for the City for the 2007/2008 financial year and what were the total expenses for the same period of time?*

*Question 4: What action has been taken on a functional review of the Council as per motions passed at the last electors meeting?*

Response 4: The Australian Institute of Management ("AIM") was engaged to undertake a Functional Review of the City's operations in August 2008. The review has commenced and should be finalised in December 2008 with a report ready for consideration by Council in February 2009.

*Question 5: What was the cost of cricket wickets placed at Hands Oval – in the oval and on the periphery?*

The cost of installing a turf and practice wicket block on Hands Oval was \$11,100 for materials. Labour costs were in the order of \$9,000 although a portion of this was sourced from the annual maintenance budget for work at Hands Oval.

The Western Australian Cricket Association provided the specialised clay material for \$6,597 to the City. The WACA also contributed (at no cost) its expertise, supervision and support for installation of the wicket area.

Funding for the project was received from the Department of Sport & Recreation (\$10,000) and South West Development Commission (\$4,800). Council's specialist turf staff also contributed time and effort.

*Question 6: Is there a development plan for Hands Oval?*

Council's Corporate Financial Plan 2008–2013 provides for improvements to facilities at Hands Oval in 2013 at an estimated cost of \$2M.

The recently elected Liberal/National State Government has also committed \$1.34M to assist with development plans for Hands Oval but has not advised when such funds will be available.

Discussions have been held with the Department of Sport & Recreation in relation to preparing a Master Plan with funding assistance from the Department, as a joint initiative with the City. Preliminary advice is that the brief for a Master Plan should be prepared once funding parameters have been clarified in terms of timing and available funds. It is expected that a Master Plan will be completed 12 months prior to major works at Hands Oval and will incorporate key stakeholder priorities along with an assessment of what can be achieved with the resources allocated/available.

Initial discussions have been held with the representatives of the Hands Oval tenants i.e., South Bunbury Football Club and South West Football League.

*Question 7: Are there plans for the City to sell any of the existing recreational areas?*

Response 7: There are no plans to sell any of the existing recreational areas.

*Question 8: Are there plans to change the use of Hay Park?*

Response 8: In August 2008, the City of Bunbury commissioned a feasibility study to determine infrastructure needs for Hay Park (and other active reserves) and develop an appropriate facility development strategy. The study will examine the feasibility of a number of sports facility developments at Hay Park including those identified in the City's Recreation Plan. The report will be finalised by 30 January 2009. The expectation is that, subject to Council review and acceptance, the

study recommendations will guide the allocation of Council resources in relation to the future provision and management of sporting facilities.

While reading the *Questions on Notice* from Dr Manea, the Mayor made the following comments:

- The City's Accounting Services Team has won awards for its budgetary and financial practices over the past 3 years, and; the City's Rangers Section has also won both State and National Awards this year for emergency management.
- The City's fiscal star rating increased from 3.5 to 4 stars as at 30 June 2008.

#### **4.2 Questions from Electors (Without Notice)**

The Mayor invited questions from electors present. A summary of questions or statements (and responses given) is as follows:

##### **Mr Phil Smith, Dunstan Street**

*Question: What is the Council's policy concerning crossings from a dual-use path to a road? In particular, I am concerned at the crossings near the Minninup Road/ Floreat Street/Adam Street intersection (and Elliot/Victoria Street intersection) where there is a "lip" between the kerbing and the path/road which makes it hazardous for people pushing strollers or people on bicycles.*

*Response: The Mayor will investigate this matter with the City's Engineering Division.*

##### **Mr Alan Parsons, Withers Resident**

*Question: In your report you mention the figure of \$7.6M as being invested? Given the current economic climate, is this investment safe?*

*Response: The Mayor advised that the City's money is invested with the 5 major banks based in Bunbury.*

**Ms Judy Wall, Carey Street, Bunbury**

- Question:*
- a) *Ms Wall asked if the City is reconsidering whether to rezone the foreshore land required for the proposed Waterfront Development and wanted to know why Landcorp is still involved? She does not want to see the situation that occurred recently in Albany (where the people's voice became superfluous) repeated in Bunbury. Ms Wall also queried whether it was within the Council's power to commission consultants to draft a plan/artistic impression of the people's specifications for the foreshore redevelopment, so that the Minister can fully appreciate what Bunbury citizens want compared with plans prepared by Landcorp.*
  - b) *Ms Wall queried whether there is any speculation by the City of Bunbury on how much revenue can be expected in Bunbury from increased tourism, should the foreshore be developed.*

- Response:*
- a) The Mayor advised that the land belongs to the State Government not the Bunbury City Council. Landcorp is the State Government's land development agency and it is responsible for obtaining all the necessary approvals for the proposed waterfront project that would be expected of any normal private developer - this includes ensuring that the land is suitably zoned for development in accordance with the City's Town Planning Scheme and the State Government's own Greater Bunbury Region Scheme or "GBRS". The GBRS is currently at odds with the City's Scheme and the City is required to amend its Scheme to comply.

The proposal by Landcorp is to make the cost of the project cost-neutral by including commercial/private development that can be sold off to fund public asset components of the project such as landscaping, demolition of the timber jetty, etc.

The Bunbury City Council's role in the project is to ascertain public opinion on behalf of the State Government and to this end, the City has undertaken an extensive public consultation program.

The City recently sent a delegation to Queensland to observe (first-hand) similar waterside developments at the Gold Coast, Townsville (foreshore of the Ross River) and Cairns. Delegates were not impressed with the Gold Coast and considered it an example of "what not to do" when developing a foreshore.

Delegates were very impressed with the foreshores in Townsville/Cairns however, which contained a multitude of public facilities including wet/dry recreational areas, public exercise equipment, boardwalks, fishing platforms, etc. Any high-rise was limited in both these areas and set away from the foreshore except the Shangri La Hotel in Cairns but it was noted that this is situated on Port Authority land. It was also evident that the foreshores in both areas were heavily utilised by the local community as the delegation visited off-season.

Based on what it has seen in Queensland and the feedback from residents, the Council needs to weigh up the economic benefits to the local community and determine what facilities would be best suited to the foreshore for the enjoyment of residents and visitors.

Residents will be clearly informed of any proposed Town Planning Scheme Amendment connected with the Waterfront Development and the associated decision of the Council.

The City will send its Structure Plan for the foreshore together with a list of public comments, to Landcorp. It will then be up to this current State Government to determine how best to fund the project as the majority of residents have objected to the private land sales component.

If Landcorp is willing to fund some of the public facilities proposed for the foreshore (as identified by the Council through its consultation with the general public); then the Council might be in a position to engage consultants to prepare plans. It is worth noting that upkeep of any public facilities on the foreshore will be the responsibility of the Council. For example, the Townsville Council employs nine people solely to maintain the foreshore area.

- b) There is no direct revenue from the project as use of walkways, playgrounds, etc. by the public would be free of charge. The Mayor refused to speculate on indirect revenue through increased tourism.

**Ms Karen Steele, MacQueen Crescent, Bunbury**

*Question:* What is the land along the foreshore in Townsville zoned as?

*Response:* The Mayor advised that it is zoned for "Parks and Recreation". It is 2.5 km long and up to 18 metres wide. A lot of the Council's expenditure is on the pool which is filled using water from the ocean that has been specifically "strained" to clear it of hazardous marine creatures.

*Question: Even if the City sends its Structure Plan for the foreshore to the State Government (via Landcorp) this is not going to stop rezoning of the foreshore from taking place - is this correct?*

Response: The Mayor advised that this is unclear from the information given to the City by Landcorp to date.

*Question: Why is cricket not played at the Old Recreation Ground (near the Bunbury Runners Club pavilion) anymore?*

Response: The Mayor advised that cricket continues to be accommodated at the Old Recreation Ground but major cricket matches are now held at Hands Oval following establishment of a new turf wicket for this purpose.

*Question: When will a footpath be installed in Hoylake Street (running the full extent of Clarke Street, through Hoylake Street to the beach)? This is too long a piece of road to have no footpath especially as it is used by many children to access the beach.*

Response: The Mayor advised that the City allocates \$500,000 per year for footpaths (and spends an extra \$250,000 per year on footpath maintenance). However, there is an historical deficit of footpaths in Bunbury and to this end a Footpath Plan has been developed to prioritise new footpath installations. Ms Steele was advised to contact Councillor Harrop in this regard. The Footpath Plan is regularly reviewed by the members of the Council.

*Question: What land (owned by the Council) is earmarked for development?*

Response: The Mayor advised that the Council has formed a Land Rationalisation & Acquisitions Committee comprising Councillors Craddock, Kelly, Whittle and Jones that is in the process of identifying these pieces of land. It is looking at what land is surplus to the City's requirements and could be sold to offset funding of other capital projects in the City. There is a document that identifies 25 properties that the City owns freehold. However, no land will be sold without the authority of the Council or without public advertising.

*Question: Is the Cricket Ground to be developed?*

Response: No. The Mayor advised that such a proposal for this property (or Forrest Park) would be unlikely to gain the support of the majority of the Council.



*Question: Why isn't the Farmers Market allowed to sell rosaries anymore?*

Response: The Mayor advised that the property is not appropriately zoned for the sale of packaged groceries.

*Question: As a way of stopping the level of vandalism caused by bored young people congregating at Back Beach at nights and on weekends, is there a grant that the City could use to purchase sporting equipment for use by young people interested in taking up a sport but who could not otherwise afford to purchase it?*

Response: The Mayor advised Ms Steele to speak with Councillor Rooney who is particularly committed to improving facilities and services for the youth of Bunbury. Unfortunately, the extent to which the City can assist in non-traditional areas of Local Government responsibility (i.e., outside roads, rates and rubbish) is contentious. The City already provides the Runaway Bus service each year and stages "Max" events at Bicentennial Square. The City also traditionally, supports the Clontarf Association.

#### **Mr Frank Comito, Strickland Street, Bunbury**

*Question: In relation to young people congregating at Back Beach as stated by Ms Steele, it can sometimes be quite intimidating for the general public at night. Why don't the rangers or the Police request the youths to move on?*

Response: This is primarily a policing matter. On mornings following every weekend and Thursday/Friday nights, the City is required to clear up large amounts of broken glass on the roads in that area. The City is considering installing CCTV and the State Government is prepared to fund employment of a person to monitor the equipment at the local Police Station.

*Question: I have heard that the Federal Government recently gave all local governments a substantial amount of funding to spend on community projects. Has the City of Bunbury received its share?*

Response: The Mayor advised that the National Seachange Task Force (of which the City of Bunbury is a member) has met regularly with representatives from the Federal Government in past years and the Prime Minister recognises the special needs of seachange councils such as Bunbury i.e., regional municipalities (usually situated near a beach) faced with the burden of providing increased infrastructure spending due to a rapid rise in population as people move in increasing numbers from cities to the country.

Bunbury has received the following funding from the Federal government:

- "Capital Projects" - the funding amount of \$487,000 must be used by 30 June 2008.
- "Capital Works" - applications for this funding close at the end of December and must be for a single project. The grant conditions will be supplied to all councillors to assist in their choice of a project.

*Question:* I notice that the former St John of God Hospital site is back up for sale. Do you think it's worth the City purchasing the site for use as a parking area? I think they are asking approximately \$3.5M for it.

*Response:* If the building is back on the market for a reasonable price then it might be a good idea for the City to at least undertake some preliminary investigation.

**Mr Andrew Roberts, Hewison Street, Bunbury**

*Question:* In connection with the proposed Withers Underground Power Precinct ("WUPP") project, I have spoken with over 100 people in the area of Withers most of whom are opposed to it. What is the project's current status?

*Response:* The Mayor advised that the original community survey was done in accordance with guidelines imposed by the Office of Energy and Western Power. While the City was waiting for final costings to be calculated, he understands the Member for Bunbury (Mr Castrilli) approached the Minister for Energy on the subject and a second survey has now been requested. This re-survey should be distributed to households in Withers circa 3 December 2008. The City will report the results of the re-survey to the Minister's office and the Minister will decide whether there is sufficient community support for the project to proceed. The Office of Energy intends holding a public meeting and door-knocking to encourage people to complete and return the survey forms. If there is insufficient majority support, the project will be cancelled and the money that the State Government had set aside for it will be spent on similar projects in other municipalities.

*Question:* My concern is that there are a lot of people in Withers like me who do not qualify for a rebate or discount. Most of the people I've spoken with are in a similar position and accordingly, are against it.

Response: One of the major land owners in the area (Department of Housing and Works) will be required to pay its percentage of the project cost upfront and will receive no rebate or reductions. Pensioners will pay a reduced rate with an option to pay their instalments over an extended period of 5 years. All land owners (other than DHW and pensioners) will be given the option to repay in instalments over 3 years at no interest.

*Question: If you receive a "yes" vote this time around, will the residents of Withers qualify for a special area rate?*

Response: No, not when some residents will be unable to afford the interest-free payments over 3 years. For those people that cannot afford to repay over 3 years, there is an extended payment period of 20 years but the City is unable to offer this interest-free. If you object to having to pay for installation of underground power in your area, please voice your concern to your local Member of Parliament.

*Question: Do you think that the project will get through?*

Response: The Mayor indicated that he did not want to be put in a position of pre-empting the results of the re-survey at this stage.

*Question: What was the outcome of the petition against the project that was signed by approximately 677 people and presented at a meeting of the Council?*

Response: The members of the Council appreciated receiving the petition although it was noted that many of the names/addresses listed were not those of people that lived or owned land in Withers. A copy of the petition will be forwarded to the Office of Energy for analysis together with other material collected throughout both public consultation periods.

*Question: For your information, when you do undertake the re-survey, approximately 17 people I spoke with in Usher and Glen Padden did not realise that they are included in the "Withers" district and subject to charges for installation of underground power.*

Response: Thank you. This has already been addressed.

**Ms Karen Steele, MacQueen Crescent, Bunbury**

*Question:* Can I suggest that if the residents of Withers reject the underground power project, the residents of South Bunbury be surveyed?

*Response:* When a member of the Executive Staff made an application to Western Power many years ago, there were originally four project areas in Bunbury but only one (Withers) managed to survive Western Power's selection process.

**Mr Bernhard Bischoff, Forster Street, Bunbury**

*Question:* Would it be theoretically possible to build a museum or historical interpretative centre as part of the Eastside Precinct (Bunbury Waterfront Project)?

*Response:* Yes but only if the land is not required for commercial development.

**Ms Joan Jenkins, Minnipup Road, Bunbury**

*Question:* I notice that the bio-sensitive portion of land in Hay Park that is to be included as part of the Ocean-to-Preston River Regional Park, has become badly degraded in recent years. Is the City going to do anything about this?

*Response:* For the time being, it has been fenced off to allow the vegetation and fauna to regenerate. The principal problem is that of weed control but I understand the Department of Environment and Conservation has not been given any funding for this land yet. As the land has now been proclaimed a regional park it should not be the City's responsibility to maintain it.

**Dr E Manea, Haydock Street, East Bunbury**

*Question:* Dr Manea referred to his *Questions on Notice* (refer to section 4.1 of these minutes). A summary of questions /statements made by Dr Manea (and responses) follows:

*Q1. When will a copy of the results of the Functional Review be made available to the public?*

*R1.* The City's Executive Manager of Corporate Services advised that the Council will receive the report at a meeting early in the New Year.

*Q2. I was surprised to hear the Mayor state that cricket in Bunbury is now centred at Hay Park.*

R2. The Mayor advised that the WA Cricket Association prefers the facilities available at Hay Park.

*Q3. In 1967 the (then) Hay Park Development Committee was established to develop the area into sporting facilities. The south eastern corner was always supposed to be retained as wetlands so I am surprised to hear it being talked about here tonight.*

R3. No response required.

*Q4. The fencing and changerooms at Hands Oval were installed in 1968. I am amazed at the amount of money the City now intends spending on an upgrade of the facility.*

R4. No response required.

*Q5. I have discovered only recently, that the actual site on which the town of "Bunbury" was founded back in the 1800's, is located on the slope of a hill near the Bunbury Primary School. Would it be possible for the City to erect a commemorative plaque at the site?*

R5. The Mayor advised that he would have someone look into this.

*Q6. Is there video surveillance of the Graham Bricknell Music Shell? I notice that Mr Bricknell's name is gradually being scratched off the glass. Can we have it repaired before the Carols by Candlelight event takes place next month?*

R6. The Mayor advised that he would have someone look into this.

**Mr Arpad Mencshelyi, Sampson Road, Bunbury**

*Question: (Speaking to the Mayor). Earlier you mentioned that you were part of a delegation that visited cities on the East Coast to view waterfront developments. Did you go to the Sunshine Coast? I believe that the waterfront developments in this area would be more relevant to Bunbury as I understand it to be a 'seachange' region?*

Response: No.

#### 4.3 Motions from Electors

At this point in proceedings, electors were invited to move/second motions for consideration by the meeting. The Mayor advised that those motions that are passed by the meeting (i.e., decisions) will be forwarded to the Council for consideration per Section 5.33 of the Local Government Act 1995, which reads: *"All decisions made at an electors' meeting are to be considered at the next ordinary council meeting or, if that is not practicable, at the first ordinary council meeting after that meeting or at a special meeting called for that purpose, whichever happens first."*

**Motion:** Bernhard Bischoff / Phil Smith

Council to declare an "all out war on weeds" in the Bunbury Municipality (funded over several years), the strategy for which is to be in place in time for the 2009 season and to include the following:

1. Identification of problem weeds
2. Identification of sources of infestation
3. Education program i.e., weed identification
4. Lectures and/or workshops hosted by experts

The City of Bunbury to investigate the option of purchasing the former St John of God hospital site and use the site for parking and/or other community purposes.

**Motion:** Joan Jenkins / Bernhard Bischoff

The Bunbury City Council take leadership and prioritize the focus of the City using the principles and practices as outlined in *"Cities as Sustainable Eco-systems - Principles and Practices"* by Peter Newman and Isobella Jennings; by:

1. Implementing the appropriate planning.
2. Setting land aside for passive transport systems.
3. Making the best of community spaces to enhance the health of the community (young people in particular).

The Bunbury City Council undertake the following as a matter of urgency:

1. Assessment of the City's carbon footprint with a view to "ramping up" efforts to reduce the footprint.
2. Introduction of a *Community Education Ecological Sustainable Program*.

2. The members of the Bunbury City Council to be congratulated and commended for their dedication to the Bunbury community, especially Councillor Alfred Leigh for his involvement in the annual *Carols by Candlelight* event.
